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
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St. George's College and St. George's Preparatory School

St. George's College Quilmes was founded in 1898 by the Rev. Canon J. T. Stevenson, C. B. E., to provide a thorough education on the principles so well established in the English Public Schools. The College stands on high ground overlooking the River Plate from which it is distant a mile and a quarter. The grounds are extensive and today cover 22½ hectares, providing ample playing fields and accommodation for 400 boys.

The buildings are divided into three groups: the Preparatory School; the Junior School; the College.

1. The Preparatory School, completed in 1929 to house boys between the ages of 8 and 12, today has accommodation for 100 boys.
2. The Junior School, for boys between 11 and 14, completed in 1945, has accommodation for 120 boys.
3. The College, for boys between the ages



of 13 and 19, who have passed their Primary Education examinations, has accommodation for 180 boys.

EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

The general principle of organization adopted is that all boys shall receive a uniform course of instruction up to the time that they pass their Sixth Grade Examination (Argentine Primary Course). As soon as this stage is over, the boys must choose one of two courses: the Argentine National College Secondary Course, or, a three year course up to the standard of the Cambridge University School Certificate, followed by two years of more specialised work depending on the boy's future career. Within this general plan, provision is made for those boys who wish to finish their Argentine Primary Course and at the same time wish to take the Common Entrance Examination of the English Public Schools.

RECREATIONS

Regular games are compulsory. During the summer cricket is played throughout the school; during the winter Rugby Football is played by the College and Junior School, and Association Football by the Preparatory School.

Athletic sports and swimming sports are

held annually.

Boxing, shooting and gymnastics are taught by qualified instructors in the Gymnasium. Physical training forms parts of the regular routine teaching.

There are tennis courts, and the College has a bat fives court.

There are three libraries in the school, one at the College, one at the Junior School and one at the Preparatory School. They are supplied with a growing collection of books, and regular newspapers and magazines.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

The School Year is divided into two Terms.

Easter Term: 8th March - 7th July.

Christmas Term: 1st August - 12th December.

These dates vary slightly from year to year.

CONDITIONS FOR ENTRY AND FEES

Boarders only are admitted.

All boys must be prepared to show that they have some knowledge of both Spanish and English, and when a boy comes from another school he must produce a good-conduct certificate from his former Head-

master. Boys over fourteen years of age are not admitted except under special circumstances.

The fees payable are as follows:

Preparatory School: \$ 850.— per Term.

Junior School & College: \$ 900.— per Term.

Standard extras approximately \$ 100.— per Term.


A reduction of \$ 25.— per Term for each brother is made when there are two brothers, and of \$ 50.— per Term for each brother if there are three.

EXTRAS. Medical Attention

Extra fees are charged for operations and consultations; for special Nurses required by individual boys in times of epidemic; for special medicines and foods; for Dentistry and Oculist's work; and for Board and Lodging in holiday time. For an annual payment of \$ 20.— parents can insure themselves against charges for extra nursing incurred while under treatment at the College.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

SCHOLARSHIPS

The following scholarships are available.

1) An annual open scholarship for boys under 15, tenable for 3 years, worth \$ 300.— a year.

2) An annual open scholarship for boys under 12, tenable for 3 years, and renewable after 3 years, worth \$ 300.— a year.

For these two scholarships an examination is held at the College during the March Term; the subjects are English, Mathematics, General Knowledge (including the Bible, History and Geography), and a paper on either Spanish or French or Latin.

3) Two scholarships granted by the Buenos Aires Great Southern Railway, for the sons of British employees of that Company. Each of these is worth £ 100 a year, tenable for 5 years, and is awarded by a competitive examination.

4) A scholarship, founded by the late Lord Vestey and Sir Edmund Vestey, known as the Frigorifico Anglo Scholarship, of the value of £ 100 a year, open to the sons of the British employees of Frigorifico Anglo.

5) Scholarships are offered by the Old Georgian Club for the sons of members who need assistance.

6) Canon Stevenson scholarships, for the sons of parents who are unable to pay all or part of the school fees.

All correspondence concerning the scholarships should be addressed to the Headmaster.

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION

Applications for admission must be sent to the Bursar on the form forwarded with the Prospectus. The Headmasters have the right to call for Entrance Examination in which boys must reach a certain standard according to age.

PAYMENT OF FEES

Payment for all pupils shall be made in advance twice a year and at least seven days before the beginning of each Term.

Three months' notice in writing must be given to the Bursar before the removal of a boy from the School. In default of such notice a half Term's fees must be paid.

CORRESPONDENCE

Letters on educational matters should be addressed to the Headmaster of the School in which the boy resides; all other correspondence should be addressed to the Bursar.
